

Unfurling stories of the artists: part eight

Summary of Talks during the exhibition

Nick Fielding brings Siberia closer to Barnsley

On 14th June 2014, Nick Fielding, journalist and author, took us on an extraordinary journey across Central Asia and Siberia. He followed the route that Thomas Witlam Atkinson of Cawthorne (1799-1861) had taken with his new wife Lucy in 1848.

He showed slides of present day landscapes compared to Thomas' unique drawings and paintings and other 19th century prints. He recounted Thomas and Lucy's pioneering adventures and extracts from Thomas' own eye witness accounts.

70 people were enthralled by this talk and became fully aware of the extent of Thomas' amazing achievements. They looked forward to the speaker returning. Descendants of Thomas' and Lucy's son Alatau were present as well as other researchers.

Dr Elizabeth Barker on the Tate family

How was Joseph Wright of Derby, famous 18th century English painter, connected to Barnsley? How did the Tate family from Gawber become such close friends with him? Answers to these questions and more were given on Saturday 28th June by Dr Lizzie Barker at the Cooper Gallery. She had come from Amherst in

Massachusetts, USA where she is Director of the Mead Art Museum at prestigious Amherst College. She researches Wright too.

She gave fascinating evidence of the artistic talent of William Tate (1747-1806) and how he had developed his own free flowing style of painting from being Joseph Wright's only professional artist pupil. She gave a vivid account of the bravura of Richard Tate (1736-1787), an amateur artist, who copied some of the most dramatic paintings of the time and exhibited them in Liverpool in the first public exhibitions of art ever outside London. All of Richard's work is undiscovered.

She called for a graduate student to take on further research into William Tate to build on that already done by BAYD and herself. Proud achievements indeed by the sons of Gawber glassmaker Paul Tate and his wife Anne who came from Raw Green, Cawthorne, her father John Longley being a farmer there.

Dr Scott Anderson brought Art Nouveau to Barnsley

Dr Scott Anderson, Lecturer in Fine Art Valuation at Southampton Solent University, took us on a different kind of journey through the career of William James Neatby (1860-1910). He was the Barnsley man who designed the famous tile interior of Harrods Meat Hall and so much more across the country! And what a fascinating journey it was from his beginnings as a ceramic artist in Leeds to his time as Head of Doulton's Architectural Ceramics Department, and beyond.

Dr Anderson provided an excellent and well informed context of the main figures of the time and showed Neatby's fine graphic work, designs for architectural ceramics, and his work as a book illustrator and wallpaper designer. He was one of the few designers to work in the Art Nouveau style in England, and created artworks that are still a visual feast for those interested in art and design in the years around 1900.

Imogen Holmes-Roe 'From Coal to Canvas'

The final talk in BAYD's Hidden Art series was on the relationship between Coal and Art. It was given by Imogen Holmes-Roe, Curator of Film and Photography at the National Coal Mining Museum (NCMM). She gave a gripping history of how mining had been captured in art, referred to how the New National Coal Board had commissioned art works from professional artists and described the lives and art of coal miners themselves including George Bissell and Barnsley born Gilbert Daykin. She talked about the NCMM's collection and showed a fine range of illustrations.

All these talks provided an excellent addition to the art work on show in the Cooper Gallery.
